Superintendent's Report – Kevin announced Michael Brooks is the recipient of this year's pioneer valley excellence in teaching award. (see attached)

#### Principal's Report

Enrollment update – Dr. Linkenhoker reported as of today there have been 171 applications received with 73 accepted and 12 registered. There are 22 students from Amherst, 5 from Hadley, 6 from Easthampton. The Guidance department is scheduling Saturday interviews, and have been looking at different advertising options for our school. There have been 5 new ads on facebook, which have reached 15,000 people since Jan 24. Another option are lawn signs displaying an "Apply Now" advertisement. Mayor Narkewicz asked

about the number of Northampton applications, Dr, Linkenhoker replied he doesn't have the number with him but it is a healthy number.

### **Business and Finance Report**

Ms Fairman gave a brief update on the finances. Reached out to Melissa King at DESE for 2017 tuition, Ms King requested she check back this week. Ms King did say that for budgeting purposes the current amount of \$17,000 should be used.

Ms Fairman gave a brief explanation of unemployment requests by seasonal coaches, there is a form that needs to be signed and submitted to unemployment that seasonal positions aren't eligible for unemployment benefits. A brief update was given on the cafeteria deficit and tuition billing, as well as sped invoicing. Mr. Farr thanked Ms Fairman for the work put in to this report.

A **MOTION** was made by Thomas M. FitzGerald and seconded by John E. Cotton to approve an amendment to SYSCO contract for \$9000

#### 4) New Business:

Massachusetts Capital Skills Grant Program Award \$401,000 (reimbursable).

A **MOTION** was made by John E. Cotton and seconded by Thomas M. FitzGerald to approve the Massachusetts Capital Skills Grant Program Award in the amount of \$401,000. This is a reimbursable grant program.

**DISCUSSION**; Mr. Farr thanked Assistant Principal, Joe Bianca and Vocational Director, Melanie Chartier along with Liz Tiley, Director of Adult Education and department heads Matt Niedzielski, Manufacturing and Chris Kelly, Electrical. This team collaborated to write the grant.

Equipment requests from tuition revolving funds.

A **MOTION** was made by Thomas M. FitzGerald and seconded by John E. Cotton to approve the Equipment requests as presented in the amount of \$130, 564 from tuition revolving funds.

**DISCUSSION;** Mr. Farr added last months list had items listed in the event the grant wasn't received; the list has since been amended. Dr. Linkenhoker thanked Business Manager Crystal Fairman for the tuition revolving account balance at the end of her report. As principal it is his duty to have the equipment the students need to learn to the best of their ability on state of the art equipment. Dr. Linkenhoker went through the list of equipment requests.

Mayor Narkewicz stated this is a new way to utilize the tuition money, generally this has only been used for shortfalls at the end of the year, and asked if this is money that has been built up from the last number of years, Mr. Farr replied yes.

Dr. Linkenhoker stated the original date was postponed due to weather; the new date is March 24<sup>th</sup> with the lock in date as 23<sup>rd</sup> and is requesting to change the calendar.

2017-18 Draft School Calendar – Dr. Linkenhoker gave a brief explanation of the calendar with the additional 25 minutes per day. Dr. Provost noted that the trustees only need to approve the start and end date of the school year and asked if this has been shared with the assosciation? Dr. Linkenhoker replied yes.



- Build it, and they will come...







# Still River Fiber Mill - April 25, 2017 (Out of State) Eastford, CT

- 1. Expose students to careers in production agriculture
  - a. Opportunities in animal science are limited without a college degree
  - b. Diversifying livestock operations ensures success
- 2. See livestock production from start to finish
  - a. Students see the processing stage of agricultural products
  - b. Reaching beyond just raising sheep
  - c. Sheep industry is dwindling in the US niche markets great opportunity for new farmers
- 3. Real-life connections
  - a. We had our own cotswold fleece processed into roving and yarn, picking it up this day
  - b. Roving and yarn will be used in co-curricular units, creating fundraising opportunities
